

# BWSW EQUITY POLICY



Our revised policy is a step in our achievement of the standards set out in "The Equality Standard: A Framework for Sport" and so reinforces the belief that water skiing is a sport that is open to all. We ask that its principles are adopted by all our affiliated clubs, staff and members.

## > SPORTS EQUITY

Sports Equity is about fairness in sport, equality of access, recognising inequalities and taking steps to address them. It involves changing the culture and the very structure of sport to ensure that it becomes equally accessible to all members of society. The following policy document sets out a number of proactive steps that will be taken to ensure the principles of sports equity are adhered to within British Water Ski & Wakeboard (BWSW).

## > EQUITY POLICY STATEMENT

BWSW is fully committed to the principles of equality of opportunity and is therefore responsible for ensuring that no member, volunteer, employee or job applicant receives less favourable treatment on the grounds of age, gender, disability, race, ethnic origin, nationality, colour, parental or marital status, pregnancy, religious belief, social status, sexual orientation or political belief. BWSW will ensure that everyone who wishes has an equal opportunity to participate in all disciplines of the sport of water skiing at all levels and in all roles, whether as a beginner, participant, athlete, or as a coach, an employee, volunteer or official.

## > PURPOSE

It is the aim of BWSW to ensure that all present/future members/employees are treated fairly and without discrimination or harassment, whether intentional or unintentional, direct or indirect.

## > COMMITMENT TO ACTION

- BWSW will display its commitment to Sports Equity via the implementation of equity as part of our Whole Sport Plan 2009 - 2013.
- Equity will be implemented in all areas of the organisation where appropriate.
- Our policy will be reviewed on an annual basis.
- BWSW is committed to the Equality Standard within water skiing.
- BWSW will provide appropriate training where appropriate to all stakeholders to raise awareness of both collective and individual responsibilities.
- BWSW recognises that, in some cases, to achieve the principle of equality, unequal effort is required and, if appropriate, will consider and implement positive action to tackle under representation wherever it is recognised.
- BWSW will publicise this policy to all stakeholders within the organisation.
- BWSW will monitor, evaluate, review and report on its policies and procedures to all its stakeholders with the organisation.

## > DISCRIMINATION/ HARASSMENT & VICTIMISATION

Discrimination can take the form of any of the following examples, but is not necessarily restricted to only those examples:

### > DIRECT DISCRIMINATION

Treating someone less favourably than you would treat others in the same circumstances on the grounds of their age, gender, disability, race, ethnicity, nationality, colour, parental or marital status, pregnancy, religious belief, social status, sexual orientation or political belief.

### > INDIRECT DISCRIMINATION

This occurs when for example a job requirement or condition is applied equally to all, which has disproportionate and detrimental effect on one sex or racial group because fewer of that group can comply with it and the requirement cannot be justified in relation to the job.

### > HARASSMENT

Harassment can be described as inappropriate actions, behaviour, comments or physical contact that is objectionable or causes offence to the recipient. It may be for example of a sexual or racial nature or it may be directed towards people because of their age, their sexuality, a disability, or some other characteristic. Such behaviour is not acceptable and neither is it excused on the grounds that the harasser did not intend it.

### > VICTIMISATION

Victimisation can be described as when one person is for example treated less favourably than others because he or she has taken action against BWSW under one of the relevant Acts (as previously outlined) or provided information about discrimination, harassment or any form of inappropriate behaviour.

BWSW regards discrimination, harassment or victimisation as serious misconduct and any employee, volunteer or member who discriminates against, harasses or victimises any other person will be liable to appropriate disciplinary action.

### > IMPLEMENTATION

All BWSW recruitment and membership material shall include the equity policy statement. This policy document will be available to all employees, members, volunteers and officials.

All employees, members, volunteers affiliated clubs, ski schools and officials have the responsibility to respect, act in accordance with and thereby support and promote the spirit and intentions of this policy.

### > COMMUNICATION

BWSW will communicate this policy to all its employees, members, volunteers, officials, affiliated clubs and ski schools, using its website, club handbook and magazine.

## > MONITORING & EVALUATION

BWSW will monitor and evaluate the success of the policy regularly and will review the policy annually. The policy will be valid for the duration of the Whole Sport Plan (2009-2013). The BWSW Management Committee will evaluate and revise this policy on an annual basis.

## > COMPLAINTS & DISCIPLINARY

To safeguard an individual's rights under the policy an employee, member, volunteer or official who believes that he/she has suffered inequitable treatment within the scope of this policy may raise the matter through the appropriate grievance procedure.

Appropriate disciplinary action will be taken against any employee, member, volunteer, affiliate or official who violates the association's equity policy.

Where the violation of the equity policy by way of harassment, victimisation or other forms of discrimination amounts to a criminal offence, the appropriate authority will be informed.

Disciplinary procedures are available on request from BWSW.
